Subject: **MISSING PERSONS - URGENT DEMAND REPORTING 2025**

Recommendation

It is recommended that the annual report detailing the status of Missing Persons Urgent Demands be received by the Peel Police Service Board (P.P.S.B.) as information.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2025, nine (9) Urgent Demands Form 5's were utilized pursuant to the *Missing Persons Act (M.P.A.), 2018*.

Discussion

1. Background

The *M.P.A.* came into effect on July 1st, 2019. In accordance with Ontario Regulation (O.Reg.) 182/19, under the *M.P.A.*, each police service is required to annually prepare and report on Urgent Demands. This report shall be presented by April 1st of each year, after which, the P.P.S.B. shall make this information publicly available by June 1st of each year.

As per section 8(1) of the *M.P.A.*, the report shall contain:

- a. The total number of urgent demands made in that year and the number of missing persons investigations to which they relate
- b. A description of the types of records specified in the urgent demands made in that year
- c. Any other prescribed information

2. Findings

No Defined System of Data Collection

The Ministry of the Solicitor General did not create a system or method of data collection to meet this requirement; it was left to each police service to develop a system that would allow them to record this reportable data.

In 2019, Peel Regional Police (P.R.P.) created Form 777, which was designed to have officers submit a request for approval to make an Urgent Demand to the Duty Inspector. This form would capture the required reporting information for the annual report. The Duty Inspectors would then forward the approved information to the Homicide & Missing Persons Bureau for tracking.

Notifications are sent out service-wide to members on this process.

All sworn members are required to take a mandatory *M.P.A.* course, which also includes information on Urgent Demands and the approval and reporting policy.

Additionally, amendments to directive I-B-122(F) were made regarding the *M.P.A.* and the Urgent Demand requirements. The changes were submitted to Quality Assurance for review and distribution to all members.

In 2025, an update was made to the Form 777 with a direct link to the Homicide & Missing Persons Bureau e-mail to improve tracking.

2025 Reporting of Urgent Demands

In 2025, nine (9) Urgent Demands Form 5's were utilized for seven (7) separate missing person investigations.

Urgent Demand Details:

1. On January 15th, 2025, a Form 5 was served on the Canadian Air Transport Security Authority (C.A.T.S.A.) for travel related data regarding a missing person. On January 16th, 2025, the missing person was located.
2. On January 17th, 2025, a Form 5 was served on the Bank of Montreal (B.M.O.) for banking data regarding a missing person. On January 17th, the missing person was located.
3. On April 2nd, 2025, a Form 5 was served on Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (C.I.B.C.) for banking data regarding a missing person. On April 3rd, 2025, the missing person was located.
4. On June 8th, 2025, a Form 5 was served on Rogers Communication Inc. regarding telephone records for a missing person. On June 8th, 2025, the missing person was located.
5. On October 13th, 2025, Form 5's were served on Rogers Communications Inc., Uber Technologies Inc. and Metrolinx. On October 14th, 2025, the missing person was located.

6. On November 25th, 2025, a Form 5 was served on Bell Canada for telephone records and location data for a missing person.
7. On November 25th, 2025, a Form 5 was served on the Ministry of Health for health records regarding a missing person. On November 27th, 2025, the missing person was located.

3. Proposed Direction

The proposed direction of the P.R.P. is to continue the use of Form 777 which was designed to have officers submit a request for approval to the Duty Inspector to make an Urgent Demand and capture the required reporting information for the annual report.

Conclusion
